## SENATE BILL 6346

State of Washington 66th Legislature 2020 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to establishing tribal representation on the 2 emergency management council; and amending RCW 38.52.040.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 38.52.040 and 2019 c 333 s 9 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (1)There is hereby created the emergency management council 7 (hereinafter called the council), to consist of not more than eighteen members who shall be appointed by the adjutant general and 8 two members appointed by the tribal advisory committee in subsection 9 10 (6) of this section. The membership of the council shall include, but 11 not be limited to, representatives of city ((and)), county, and 12 tribal governments, sheriffs and police chiefs, the Washington state patrol, the military department, the department of ecology, state and 13 local fire chiefs, seismic safety experts, state and local emergency 14 15 management directors, search and rescue volunteers, medical professions who have expertise in emergency medical care, building 16 17 officials, private industry, and the office of the superintendent of 18 public instruction. The representatives of private industry shall 19 include persons knowledgeable in emergency and hazardous materials 20 management. The councilmembers shall elect a chair from within the 21 council membership. The members of the council shall serve without

1 compensation, but may be reimbursed for their travel expenses 2 incurred in the performance of their duties in accordance with RCW 3 43.03.050 and 43.03.060 as now existing or hereafter amended.

(2) The emergency management council shall advise the governor 4 and the director on all matters pertaining to state and local 5 6 emergency management. The council may appoint such ad hoc committees, subcommittees, and working groups as are required to develop specific 7 recommendations for the improvement of emergency management 8 practices, standards, policies, or procedures. The council shall 9 10 ensure that the governor receives an annual assessment of statewide 11 emergency preparedness including, but not limited to, specific progress on hazard mitigation and reduction efforts, implementation 12 of seismic safety improvements, reduction of flood hazards, and 13 coordination of hazardous materials planning and response activities. 14 15 The council shall review administrative rules governing state and 16 local emergency management practices and recommend necessary 17 revisions to the director.

(3) The council or a council subcommittee shall serve and 18 19 periodically convene in special session as the state emergency response commission required by the emergency planning and community 20 21 right-to-know act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 11001 et seq.). The state emergency 22 response commission shall conduct those activities specified in 23 federal statutes and regulations and state administrative rules governing the coordination of hazardous materials policy including, 24 25 but not limited to, review of local emergency planning committee emergency response plans for compliance with the 26 planning 27 requirements in the emergency planning and community right-to-know 28 act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 11001 et seq.). Committees shall annually review their plans to address changed conditions, and submit their plans to 29 the state emergency response commission for review when updated, but 30 31 not less than at least once every five years. The department may 32 employ staff to assist local emergency planning committees in the development and annual review of these emergency response plans, with 33 an initial focus on the highest risk communities through which trains 34 that transport oil in bulk travel. By March 1, 2018, the department 35 36 shall report to the governor and legislature on progress towards 37 compliance with planning requirements. The report must also provide budget and policy recommendations for continued support of local 38 39 emergency planning.

1 (4)(a) The intrastate mutual aid committee is created and is a 2 subcommittee of the emergency management council. The intrastate 3 mutual aid committee consists of not more than five members who must 4 be appointed by the council chair from council membership. The chair 5 of the intrastate mutual aid committee is the military department 6 representative appointed as a member of the council. Meetings of the 7 intrastate mutual aid committee must be held at least annually.

(b) In support of the intrastate mutual aid system established in 8 chapter 38.56 RCW, the intrastate mutual aid committee shall develop 9 and update guidelines and procedures to facilitate implementation of 10 11 the intrastate mutual aid system by member jurisdictions, including but not limited to the following: Projected or anticipated costs; 12 checklists and forms for requesting and providing assistance; 13 recordkeeping; reimbursement procedures; and other implementation 14 15 issues. These guidelines and procedures are not subject to the rule-16 making requirements of chapter 34.05 RCW.

17 (5) On emergency management issues that involve early learning, 18 kindergarten through twelfth grade, or higher education, the 19 emergency management council must consult with representatives from 20 the following organizations: The department of children, youth, and 21 families; the office of the superintendent of public instruction; the 22 state board for community and technical colleges; and an association 23 of public baccalaureate degree-granting institutions.

24 (6) The tribal advisory committee is created and is a 25 subcommittee of the emergency management council. The tribal advisory 26 committee consists of up to twenty-nine members from each of the 27 tribes in the state that choose to appoint a representative to the 28 committee. Meetings of the tribal advisory committee must be held at 29 least annually. The tribal advisory committee will serve to:

30 <u>(a) Select and appoint two members to serve on the emergency</u> 31 <u>management council. One member shall be a tribal representative from</u> 32 <u>an eastern tribe in Washington and one member shall be a tribal</u> 33 <u>representative from a western tribe in Washington;</u>

34 (b) Provide tribal technical expertise to the emergency 35 management council; and

36 (c) Provide important information to the twenty-nine tribes on 37 policies or actions by the emergency management council that may 38 impact any one or more of the twenty-nine tribes.
