1 **Relating to:** condemning the mass shooting that occurred in Las Vegas, Nevada, on  $\mathbf{2}$ October 1, 2017. 3 Whereas, around 10:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 1, 2017, in Las Vegas, Nevada, a gunman rained down a barrage of gunfire onto a concert crowd of around 22,000 4 5 people from the 32nd floor of a nearby hotel; and 6 Whereas, 59 or more persons died and more than 520 were injured as a result 7 of the gunman's act of terror, making it the worst mass shooting in modern United 8 States history; and 9 Whereas, the members of the State Assembly remember and honor those who 10 needlessly lost their lives on October 1, 2017, as well as the lives affected, harmed, 11 and lost every day as a result of gun violence; and 12 Whereas, an outpouring of prayers, condolences, and thoughts alone cannot

address the gun-inspired terror and violence that is plaguing our country; and
