3 (a) As used in this act:

5 (xix) "Indigent general access clients" means persons who do not have private or public health insurance 6 that provides coverage for mental illness or substance use 7 8 disorder treatment and whose total household income is not 9 more than two hundred percent (200%) of the federal poverty 10 level. After July 1, 2026 a person who has private or public health insurance that provides coverage for mental 11 12 illness or substance use disorder treatment shall not 13 qualify as "indigent general access clients";

Section 2. If a behavioral health center sends the 15 16 department of health a claim for behavioral health 17 services, the department shall pay the claim in the same manner as it would have prior to the behavioral health 19 redesign, recognizing that providers have been and will 20 continue to be obligated contractually to bill private 21 health insurance and other liable third parties before submitting claims to the state. The department shall 22 23 utilize its claims processing system and data warehouse
