1 AN ACT relating to education; providing for voluntary
2 student expression of religious expression in public
3 schools; specifying requirements for school districts; and
4 providing for an effective date.
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6 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:
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8 Section 1. W.S. 21-4-701 through 21-4-706 are created

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11 ARTICLE 7

12 WYOMING STUDENT RELIGIOUS LIBERTIES ACT OF 2015

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1 21-4-701. Wyoming Student Religious Liberties Act of 2015. 2 3 4 This article shall be cited as the "Wyoming Student 5 Religious Liberties Act of 2015." 6 7 21-4-702. Student expression. 8 (a) A public school district shall not discriminate 9 10 against students or parents on the basis of a religious viewpoint or religious expression. 11 12 (b) A school district shall treat a student's 13 14 voluntary expression of a religious viewpoint, if any, on an otherwise permissible subject in the same manner the 15 16 district treats a student's voluntary expression of a 17 secular or other viewpoint on an otherwise permissible subject and may not discriminate against the student based 18 on a religious viewpoint expressed by the student on an 19 20 otherwise permissible subject.

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22 **21-4-703**. Religious expression in class assignments.

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Students may express their beliefs about religion in 1 2 homework, artwork and other written and oral assignments 3 free from discrimination based on the religious content of 4 their submissions. Homework and classroom assignments shall be judged by ordinary academic standards of substance and 5 relevance and against other legitimate pedagogical concerns 6 identified by the school district. Students may not be 7 8 penalized or rewarded on account of the religious content 9 of their work. If an assignment requires a student's 10 viewpoint to be expressed in coursework, artwork or other 11 written or oral assignments, a public school shall not 12 penalize or reward a student on the basis of religious 13 content or a religious viewpoint. In an assignment requiring a student's viewpoint, a student's academic work 14 that expresses a religious viewpoint shall be evaluated 15 16 based on ordinary academic standards of substance and 17 relevance to the course curriculum or requirements of the 18 coursework or assignment.

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20 **21-4-704**. Freedom to organize religious groups and 21 activities.

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1 Students in public schools may pray or engage in (a) 2 religious activities or religious expression before, during 3 and after the school day in the same manner and to the same 4 extent that students may engage in nonreligious activities 5 expression. Students may organize prayer or groups, religious clubs or other religious gatherings 6 during and after school to the same extent that students 7 8 are permitted to organize other noncurricular student activities and groups. 9 (b) Religious groups shall be given the same access

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11 12 to school facilities for assembling as is given to other noncurricular groups without discrimination based on the 13 14 religious content of the students' expression. If student groups that meet for nonreligious activities are permitted 15 16 to advertise or announce meetings of the groups, the school district shall not discriminate against groups that meet 17 18 for prayer or other religious speech.

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20 (c) A school district may disclaim school sponsorship 21 of noncurricular groups and events in a manner that neither 22 favors nor disfavors groups that meet to engage in prayer 23 or religious speech.

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2 Students in public schools may wear clothing, (d) 3 accessories and jewelry that display religious messages or 4 religious symbols in the same manner and to the same extent 5 that other types of clothing, accessories and jewelry that display messages or symbols are permitted. 6 7 8 21-4-705. Limited public forum; school district 9 policy. 10 11 To ensure that the school district does not (a) 12 discriminate against a student's publicly stated voluntary 13 expression of a religious viewpoint, if any, and to eliminate any actual or perceived affirmative school 14 15 sponsorship or attribution to the district of a student's 16 expression of a religious viewpoint, if any, a school district shall adopt a policy permitting a limited public 17 18 forum for student speakers in the event students or parents 19 request such a forum. 20

21 (b) The policy regarding the limited public forum 22 shall require the school district to, upon request, provide

23 the forum in a manner that does not discriminate against a

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1	student's voluntary expression of a religious viewpoint, if
2	any, on an otherwise permissible subject.
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4	(c) Student expression on an otherwise permissible
5	subject shall not be excluded from the limited public forum
6	because the subject is expressed from a religious
7	viewpoint.
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9	(d) Not later than August 15, 2015, all school
10	districts shall adopt and implement a policy regarding a
11	limited public forum and voluntary student expression of
12	religious viewpoints.
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14	21-4-706. Construction.
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16	(a) This act shall not be construed to authorize the
17	state or any of its political subdivisions to:
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19	(i) Require any person to participate in prayer
20	or in any other religious activity; or
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22	(ii) Violate the constitutional rights of any
23	person.

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2	(b) This act shall not be construed to limit the
3	authority of any public school to:
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5	(i) Maintain order and discipline on the campus
6	of the public school in a content and viewpoint neutral
7	manner;
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9	(ii) Protect the safety of students, employees
10	and visitors of the public school; or
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12	(iii) Adopt and enforce policies and procedures
13	regarding student speech at school provided that the
14	policies and procedures do not violate the rights of
15	students as guaranteed by the United States and Wyoming
16	constitutions and laws.
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18	Section 2. This act applies beginning with the
19	2015-2016 school year.

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Section 3. This act is effective July 1, 2015.
