## A BILL

for

- 1 AN ACT relating to livestock; providing for the disposal of
- 2 estrays, livestock and feral livestock; adding definitions;
- 3 providing for the disposal of meat from slaughter as
- 4 specified; making conforming amendments; and providing for
- 5 an effective date.

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7 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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- 9 **Section 1.** W.S. 11-24-101(a) by creating a new
- 10 paragraph (iv) and by renumbering (iv) as (v), 11-24-102,
- 11 11-24-108(c) through (f), 11-24-111, 11-24-112,
- 12 11-29-101(a) by creating a new paragraph (iv) and by
- 13 renumbering (iv) as (v), 11-29-110, 11-48-101(a) by
- 14 creating a new paragraph (v) and 11-48-102(c) and (e) are
- 15 amended to read:

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17 **11-24-101.** Definitions.

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2 (a) As used in this act:

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(iv) "Disposal" means to sell, send to slaughter

5 or destroy the animal;

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10 11-24-102. Taking up estrays; generally.

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(a) No person shall take up and retain possession of 12 13 an estray except in the county where he resides and is a freeholder, nor unless the animal is found on lands owned, 14 leased, or controlled by him or his duly authorized agents. 15 When any person takes up an estray he shall immediately 16 17 notify an inspector who shall inspect or cause to be inspected the estray for brands and other evidence of 18 ownership and make a diligent effort to learn or determine 19 20 ownership of the animal. The inspector may cause any estray 21 to be held for not more than ten (10) days after the 22 inspection at a total expense of not more than fifty cents (\$.50) per day to enable him to complete his investigation 23 of ownership. If the estray is claimed by an owner, the 24

bill for feed and care incurred by the inspector must be 1 paid by the claimant. If the rightful owner cannot be 2 3 found, or when found, refuses or fails to pay the charges 4 for feed and care of the estray, the inspector shall order 5 the estray sent to the most feasible convenient public market designated by the inspector to be sold be disposed 6 7 of. Incurred charges for feed and care by the inspector and reasonable shipping and sales disposal expense shall be 8 9 paid from the proceeds of sale the disposal. The net 10 proceeds, if any, received from the sale disposal of the 11 estray after deduction of authorized expenses, shall be forwarded to the estray fund of the board or its agency. 12 13 The board or agency shall hold the proceeds in a special fund known as estray fund until paid to the rightful owner 14

of the estray or otherwise disposed of according to law.

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(c) The board shall provide meat from estrays
disposed of by slaughter, at the board's cost, to Wyoming
state institutions or to nonprofit organizations.

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2 11-24-108. Stock at large or picketed on public 3 highways; penalties for violations; impoundment and 4 disposition; fees; proceeds from disposition thereof; 5 removal of dead or injured animals.

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(c) Any sheriff, deputy sheriff, livestock brand inspector, or officer or trooper of the Wyoming highway 8 9 patrol, after notification to the owner of livestock described in subsection (a) of this section, if known, 10 shall within four (4) hours remove the livestock from the 11 public highway, impound the same in the nearest convenient 12 13 place where feed and water are available and immediately notify the owner, if known, of the action. If ownership is 14 not known, the impounding officer shall report his action 15 to an inspector. The inspector shall make a diligent effort 16 17 to ascertain ownership of the impounded livestock, and for this purpose may hold the livestock not more than ten (10) 18 days. If unable to determine ownership, the inspector shall 19 20 ship dispose of the impounded livestock. to the nearest 21 available market to be sold as estrays. Reasonable 22 transportation and sales disposal expenses shall be paid 23 from the proceeds of the sale disposal, if any.

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A removal fee of not to exceed ten dollars 1 (d) 2 (\$10.00) per head shall be allowed for the expense incurred 3 in removing livestock from any public highway and an 4 impounding fee of not to exceed five dollars (\$5.00) per 5 day per head shall be allowed the person responsible for feed and care of the livestock removed. The inspector is 6 responsible for collection and payment to the rightful 7 claimants of removal and impounding fees when impounded 8 9 livestock is surrendered to the owner. Upon shipment to a 10 market disposal, the total amount of removal and impounding 11 fees shall be made known to the selling agency at the market or slaughter plant by the inspector and shall 12 13 constitute a first claim on the net proceeds of the 14 livestock after shipping and sales disposal expenses have been paid, and shall be forwarded by the selling agency to 15 the claimant. 16

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(e) Should the proceeds of sale—the disposition of any impounded animal be insufficient to pay all legitimate shipping and sales—disposal expenses and the removal and impounding fees approved by the inspector, the deficit deficiency shall be paid by the board or its agency.

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1 (f) The net proceeds, if any, from sale the
2 disposition of the impounded livestock after deduction of
3 removal, impounding, trucking and sale disposition
4 expenses, shall be forwarded to the estray account of the
5 board. The board shall hold the proceeds until paid to the
6 rightful owner of the livestock or otherwise disposed of
7 according to law.

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9 11-24-111. Disposition of proceeds; remission to 10 board.

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All persons shipping estrays shall immediately remit to the livestock board the proceeds received for each and every estray sold disposed of, a receipt for which was given to an inspector. If any inspector sells an estray from this state, he shall immediately remit the proceeds to the livestock board.

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19 11-24-112. Deposition of proceeds; payment to owner 20 on proof of ownership; unclaimed proceeds generally.

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22 If the lawful owner of any estray sold disposed of is found 23 within one (1) year after sale the disposal of the estray,

24 the net amount received from the sale disposal less one

1 dollar (\$1.00) for each estray, to be retained by the livestock board, shall be paid to the owner upon his 2 3 proving ownership to the satisfaction of the board or 4 agency. If at the end of one (1) year the proceeds from the 5 sale disposal of any estray remains unclaimed, the proceeds shall be disposed of as provided by law. 6 7 11-29-101. Any person entitled to a lien under this act may enforce the lien by selling disposing of the animals and other personal property upon which the lien is given, at public auction, upon giving written notice to the owner, if he is

1 known, of the time and place of the sale disposal, at least 2 five (5) days previous thereto, and by posting three (3) 3 notices of the time and place of the sale disposal in three 4 (3) public places within the county at least five (5) days 5 previous thereto. If the owner is not known, the notice shall be posted at least ten (10) days previous to the sale 6 disposal. 7 8 9 11-48-101. Definitions. 10 11 As used in this chapter: (a) 12 13 (v) "Disposal" means as defined W.S. 14 11-24-101(a)(iv). 15 11-48-102. Disposition of feral livestock. 16 17

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(c) If the director or the state veterinarian determines that any feral livestock are damaging private or public property, including grass, cultivated crops stored crops, or determines the feral livestock is on private or public property where the feral livestock are not authorized to be and that capturing the feral livestock is not feasible or is cost prohibitive, the director or the

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1 state veterinarian may order the  $\frac{\mbox{\scriptsize destruction}}{\mbox{\scriptsize disposition}}$  of

2 the feral livestock.

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(e) There shall be no right for any future indemnity
or payment to the owner for the destruction—disposition of
any feral livestock destroyed—disposed of in accordance
with this section. Should the owner of any feral livestock
destroyed—disposed of in accordance with this section be
subsequently identified, the board may seek reimbursement
from the owner for all costs associated with the

destruction disposal and removal of the feral livestock.
