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5 In addition to paragraph (a)(i) of this section, state superintendent shall promulgate rules 6 the regulations governing the administration of the Wyoming 7 education resource block grant model adopted by the Wyoming 8 9 legislature as defined under W.S. 21-13-309, and governing the operation of the model in determining school district 10 11 foundation program payments in accordance with chapter 13, article 3 of this title and other applicable law. 12 The 13 block grant model, as defined under W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xiv) and as maintained under this subsection, shall be made 14 available for public inspection by the state superintendent 15 in electronic format. 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(a) Each school district shall design and implement a reading screening program that measures student reading progress in grades one (1) and two (2) kindergarten through grade three (3). The screening program shall be designed by each school district include a reading assessment plan using screening instruments approved by the department of education, which is administered to all students in kindergarten through grade three (3), with standardized measures providing statewide longitudinal data and providing the capability for monitoring and measuring reading progress. The program shall also include a plan for implementation of research based core curricula aligned to the statewide educational program standards and shall

specifically screen for student performance in reading at 1

2 grades one (1) and two (2) evidenced based interventions to

3 meet the needs of all students.

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(b) Students not screening successfully shall be assessed to identify the specific reading problem and determine its nature. Students not showing appropriate 7 reading competence under this section shall be placed on an 8 9 individualized or group reading plan to remedy the reading 10 related difficulty utilizing an appropriate evidence based intervention program. For students under an individualized education program (IEP) which addresses reading difficulties, the IEP shall be deemed sufficient to meet the requirements of this subsection and no additional plan shall be required. 15

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(c) For school year 2002-2003 and each school year thereafter, Each district shall annually report to the department of education on the progress toward reaching the of eighty-five percent (85%) of identified all students being reading proficient at grade level upon completion of the third grade. The report shall include longitudinal data on all students in grades one (1) through four (4) identified for intervention. If the goal is not

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1 reached, the district shall report the reason the goal was 2 not reached and the steps being taken by the district to 3 solve the problem kindergarten through grade three (3), and 4 shall include the percentage of students meeting or 5 exceeding proficiency levels for the reporting period. Each district not meeting the eighty-five percent (85%) 6 goal specified under this subsection shall submit an 7 improvement plan to the department. At a minimum, the 8 9 improvement plan shall outline the district's general strategy for increasing reading proficiency for the next 10 11 school year and shall specifically address the studentteacher ratio, the use of certified tutors and the use of 12 13 instructional facilitators in kindergarten through grade 14 three (3) in all schools within the district. 15 21-13-101. 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(B) For <u>each</u> school year, 2006-2007, the configuration of grades for each school shall be based upon the ADM reported for each grade in which students were enrolled for the 2005-2006 immediately preceding school year;

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(C) After the 2006-2007 school year, and 1 2 Excluding charter schools established under W.S. 21-3-301 3 through 21-3-314, any modification to the configuration of grades in which students are enrolled during any school 4 5 year such that the configuration differs from that in which students were enrolled during the 2005 2006 immediately 6 preceding school year shall be documented by the district 7 within reports submitted under this subsection and shall 8 9 require approval by the state superintendent. Approval by 10 the state superintendent under this subparagraph shall be 11 based upon appropriate delivery of the required educational the cost effectiveness of the modified grade 12 program, 13 configuration for the delivery of adequate educational services to students and any extraordinary circumstances 14 related to the safe and efficient delivery of the education 15 program to students. This subparagraph relates only to the 16 17 configuration of schools for application to the education resource block grant model and not to the authority of a 18 district to configure grade levels at each of its schools. 19

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(v) Based upon ADM computations and identified school configurations within each district pursuant to paragraph (iv) of this subsection, compute the foundation program amount for each district as prescribed by the

1 education resource block grant model adopted by the Wyoming

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(C) Salaries for all school and district 12 13 level staffing categories, including teachers, principals and assistant principals, central office administrators, 14 secretarial and clerical staff, operations and maintenance 15 staff and aides and media technicians, shall be based upon 16 17 average statewide salary levels calibrated for school year 2005-2006 for each staffing category, adjusted under 18 subsection (o) of this section, including the experience, 19 20 education and responsibility level as appropriate and as 21 computed for each staffing category. The statewide average for each staffing category shall be adjusted for each 22 district based upon the district experience, education and 23

responsibility level relative to the statewide average for

1 that category. District experience, education 2 responsibility level by appropriate staffing category shall 3 be updated each year such that district adjustments reflect 4 the prior school year staffing information. The district 5 adjusted average salary for each staffing category shall be further adjusted for regional cost differences as measured 6 by the greater of the hedonic wage index or the Wyoming 7 cost-of-living index computed by the division of economic 8 9 analysis, department of administration and information, with a minimum of one hundred (100) 10 index value, prescribed by the education resource block grant model. For 11 purposes of the education resource block grant model, the 12 13 version of the Wyoming cost-of-living index used by the division shall be based upon the unrecalibrated housing 14 cost index weights unless otherwise determined by the 15 upon recommendation of 16 legislature based the 17 education interim committee. In addition, the version of Wyoming cost-of-living index applied under 18 the subparagraph for any school year shall be the average of 19 20 the six (6) consecutive semi-annual index reports completed 21 by January 1 of the immediately preceding school year;

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(D) Vocational Career-vocational education 1 2 computations within the education resource block grant 3 model shall be based upon: 4 5 (G) Amounts within the block grant model for maintenance and operations shall be based upon actual 6 gross square footage of school buildings and facilities 7 subject to the following: 8 9 10 Actual gross square footage of (II)11 education space shall be the gross square footage prescribed statewide building adequacy standards 12 by promulgated pursuant to W.S. 21-15-115. 13 Education space capacity in excess of the following specified maximum 14 percentages of one hundred fifteen percent (115%) of the 15 standard space level shall not be included in actual gross 16 17 square footage computations under this subdivision. + 18 (o) To the extent specifically provided within the 19 20 foundation program budget as enacted 21 legislature, and between periods of model recalibration required under subsection (t) of this section, the amount 22 computed for each district under subsection (m) of this 23 24 section shall be adjusted to provide for the effects of

1 inflation, excluding those amounts specified under 2 subparagraphs (m)(v)(E) and (F) of this section, shall be 3 adjusted to provide for the effects of inflation and the 4 assessment component contained in paragraph (b) (xxviii) of 5 "Attachment A" as referenced in W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xvii). The adjustment under this subsection shall not be applied 6 until the expiration of the school year 7 immediately following the first school year of application of the 8 9 recalibrated model, and shall be adjusted on a cumulative basis each school year thereafter and until the first 10 11 school year of application of a subsequent model recalibration. Following analysis of information reported 12 13 under subsection (u) of this section, the joint appropriations committee shall submit a recommendation to 14 the legislature and the governor not later than November 1 15 of each applicable year on an external cost adjustment for 16 17 purposes of this subsection.

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(u) To ensure model components specified under the education resource block grant model defined under W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xiv), as enumerated and enacted by the legislature and included in "Attachment A" referenced in W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xvii), remain resourced at cost-based levels between periods of model recalibration required

under subsection (t) of this section, and prior to 1 adjustment for the effects of inflation for any school year 2 3 under subsection (o) of this section, the joint education 4 interim committee shall annually receive and review reports 5 in accordance with this subsection and report to the joint appropriations interim committee as required by this 6 7 subsection. The legislative service office shall assemble information necessary to develop a model monitoring process 8 9 and other reports for the committee using data maintained by the department of education and other state agencies. 10 For this purpose, the department shall annually update and 11 compile information, in a format contained within reports 12 provided during 2010 model recalibration, reported at the 13 14 model component level, on school district allocation of model resources, as well as other information provided for 15 purposes of developing and completing the 2010 cost of 16 17 education studies. 1 to one-half (1/2) of the difference between the amount

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5 The department of education shall adopt necessary rules and regulations to implement and enforce 6 standards established under this section and to administer 7 section. District expenditures computed under 8 this 9 subsection (b) of this section shall not include 10 expenditures for employee contributions to the Wyoming 11 retirement system exceeding five and fifty-seven hundredths percent (5.57%). In addition, the department shall, 12 13 accordance with procedures prescribed by department rule and regulation, establish a base price for each school bus 14 type or other student transportation vehicle type for the 15 applicable fiscal period that complies with minimum state 16 17 standards for vehicle specifications and equipment. also establish a process 18 department shall including competitive bidding which guarantees the acquisition of 19 20 school buses and other student transportation vehicles 21 approved for reimbursement and complying with state minimum standards and district fleet size restrictions at 22 the 23 established base price for the applicable fiscal year. addition and for purposes of reimbursement under subsection 24

Grant amounts 8 9 shall be computed by the department for the eligible 10 applicant district as if the education resource block grant model contained the following component for instructional 11 facilitators, funded at an amount equal to sixty percent 12 13 (60%) for each full-time equivalent position, prorated up and down from the FTE position level specified for each 14 prototype similar to computational operation of other 15 components within the block grant model: 16 17 (iv) "FTE" and "ADM" as used in this section 18 shall be as defined in ATTACHMENT "A", to 2006 Wyoming 19 Session Laws, Chapter 37, as referenced in W.S. 20 21 21-13-101(a)(xvii).

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(e) Financial assistance to each qualifying applicant 23 24 school district shall be made by the department from

1 amounts appropriated by the legislature to the foundation program account for purposes of the program established by 2 3 this section and shall be in addition to the foundation program amount computed for that district under W.S. 4 5 21-13-309(p). If there is an insufficient amount within the foundation program account from amounts appropriated by 6 the legislature for financial assistance under this section 7 for any school year, the department shall make a pro rata 8 9 reduction in financial assistance payments among all qualifying districts for that 10 school year. expenditures of amounts distributed under this section 11 shall be solely for district instructional facilitator and 12 13 instructional coaching programs in accordance with the program documentation submitted by 14 the district under subsection (b) of this section. 15 The department withhold a portion or the entire amount to be distributed 16 17 to any district under this section for noncompliance with program documentation required to be submitted by the 18 19 applicant district. Any appropriated amounts not expended 20 or encumbered under this subsection as of July 1 of that 21 school year immediately following the school year for which 22 the appropriation applies, shall revert to the foundation 23 program account.
