Effective school year 2013-2014, and each 6 (iv) school year thereafter, require district administration of 7 common benchmark adaptive assessments statewide in reading 8 9 and mathematics for grades one (1) through eight (8) in accordance with W.S. 21-3-110(a)(xxiv). The board shall 10 11 establish, in consultation with local districts, requirements for students to earn a high school 12 13 diploma as measured by each district's assessment system prescribed by rule and regulation of the state board and 14 required under W.S. 21-3-110(a)(xxiv). Beginning school 15 year 2014-2015, and each school year thereafter, each 16 17 district's assessment system shall include a measure or multiple measures for purposes of determining completion of 18 high school graduation requirements. The state board shall 19 by rule and regulation establish guidelines for district 20 21 development of this measure or measures, and shall through 22 the department of education, provide support to districts in developing each district's measure or measures. 23 The 24 state board shall through the department, annually review

The district shall on or 6 before August 1, 2015, and each August 1 thereafter, report 7 to the state board in accordance with W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iv) 8 9 on its assessment system established under this paragraph. 10 Beginning school year 2013-2014 and each school year 11 thereafter, a component of the district assessment system shall include common benchmark adaptive assessments for 12 13 reading and mathematics in grades two (2) through eight (8), common to all districts statewide, administered at 14 least two (2) times during any one (1) school year and 15 administered once in grade one (1). An additional 16 17 component of the district assessment system shall continue longitudinal of 18 study summer school effectiveness which uses a single common benchmark adaptive 19 20 assessment in reading and mathematics administered for 21 summer school and extended day intervention and remediation 22 programs in accordance with W.S. 21-13-334(h)(iv);

If a final order by the district court of Laramie 14 County, Wyoming, is issued implementing without change the 15 final ruling of the Wyoming Supreme Court issued January 16 17 28, 2014, in the case of Kerry and Clara Powers, on behalf of themselves and the citizens of Wyoming, and Cindy Hill, 18 19 on behalf of herself and as the Superintendent of Public Instruction v. State of Wyoming and Matthew H. 20 21 Governor, in his official capacity [Docket No. S-13-0052], 22 then upon expiration of time for appeal of that order, or if appealed, upon issuance of a final order or mandate of 23 24 the Wyoming Supreme Court confirming the district court

1 final order, the Governor shall certify the entry of the

2 district court final order. The Governor shall immediately

3 file any certification under this section together with the

4 final order with the secretary of state. Upon filing

5 certification with the secretary of state, section 3 of

6 this act is effective and shall supersede section 2 of this

7 act.
