1 finance; AN ACT relating to school implementing modifications to the Wyoming education resource block grant 2 model; codifying previously uncodified law; amending the 3 computation of average daily membership; increasing the 4 amount that can be computed for a school district's 5 operating balance and cash reserves 6 as specified; 7 prohibiting expenditures on capital construction during a 8 specified period; amending provisions governing the 9 distribution of investment earnings; amending provisions 10 governing the distribution of severance taxes; implementing 11 a sales and use tax for school finance; providing for distribution of the taxes; amending related provisions; 12 13 repealing conflicting provisions; providing applicability; 14 providing for a study on the reorganization of school 15 districts; requiring a report; and providing for effective 16 dates.

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1 2 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 3 4 Section 1. W.S. 21-13-309.1 is created to read: 5 6 21-13-309.1. Education resource block grant model 7 components. 8 9 (a) This section is intended to specify the education resource block grant model components and computations 10 necessary to execute the 2020 cost of education study as 11 required by W.S. 21-13-309(t) and as adopted and modified 12 13 by the legislature. 14 (b) As used in this section: 15 16 17 (i) "Block grant model components" includes the following categories: 18 19 20 (A) The educational materials category of model components which includes the following: 21 22

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1 (I) The books and instructional 2 materials component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxi) of 3 this section; 4 5 The gifted and talented students (II)component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxiii) of this 6 section; 7 8 9 (III) The and technical career education equipment and materials component resourced under 10 paragraph (c)(xxiv) of this section; 11 12 13 The student activities component (IV) resourced under paragraph (c)(xxv) of this section; 14 15 16 (V) The professional development 17 component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxvi) of this section; 18 19 20 (VI) The central office nonpersonnel resources component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxviii) 21 of this section; 22 23

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1 (VII) The operations and maintenance 2 supplies component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxx) of 3 this section. 4 5 (B) The energy category of model components which includes the utilities component resourced under 6 7 paragraph (c)(xxxi) of this section; 8 9 (C) The nonprofessional labor category of 10 model components which includes supervisory aides, central office classified staff, school secretaries, school 11 12 clerical staff, maintenance workers, groundskeepers and custodians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this 13 section; 14 15 16 (D) The professional labor category of 17 model components which includes teachers, principals, 18 assistant principals, superintendents, assistant 19 superintendents, business managers and school computer 20 technicians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this 21 section.

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1 (ii) "FTE" means the full-time equivalency basis 2 as computed in accordance with guidelines prescribed by 3 rule and regulation of the department of education; 4 5 (iii) "Grade band" school means а grade configuration that falls within one (1) of the following 6 7 configurations: 8 9 An elementary school grade band that (A) 10 includes grades kindergarten through grade six (6) or any combination of those grades; 11 12 13 middle school grade (B) A band that 14 includes grade five (5) through eight (8) or grade six (6) through grade nine (9) or any combination of grades within 15 16 those ranges; 17 (C) A high school grade band that includes 18 19 grade eight (8) through grade twelve (12)or any 20 combination of those grades. 21

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1 (c) The Wyoming education resource block grant model 2 components and the resourcing for those components shall be 3 as follows: 4 5 (i) Full day kindergarten. Funded for all elementary schools; 6 7 8 (ii) Core teachers for schools with ADM greater than forty-nine (49) and schools not designated 9 as alternative schools: 10 11 (A) Elementary school. Calculated as 12 ADM 13 divided by sixteen (16); 14 15 (B) Middle school. Calculated ADM as 16 divided by twenty-one (21); 17 (C) High school. Calculated as ADM divided 18 19 by twenty-one (21). 20 (iii) Specialist teachers for schools with more 21 than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as 22 alternative schools: 23

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1 2 (A) Elementary school specialist teachers 3 shall be calculated as twenty percent (20%) of the core 4 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(A) of this subsection; 5 (B) Middle school specialist teachers shall б be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core 7 8 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(B) of this subsection; 9 10 (C) High school specialist teachers shall 11 be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core 12 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(C) of this subsection. 13 14 (iv) Additional vocational education teachers. 15 For schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools 16 not designated as alternative schools, calculated as the 17 product of each high school's FTE vocational education 18 students reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(I)19 multiplied by twenty-nine hundredths (0.29) then divided by 20 the high school class size of twenty-one (21); 21 Small school and alternative school core 22 (v) staff. For schools with forty-nine (49) or less ADM or 23

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1 alternative schools, provide one (1) teacher position for 2 every seven (7) ADM, calculated as total school ADM divided 3 by seven (7). Each school shall receive a minimum of one 4 (1) teacher by increasing the sum of the core staff in this 5 paragraph to one (1) if the total is less than one (1); б 7 (vi) Minimum teachers: 8 The minimum number of teachers for any 9 (A) 10 elementary school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is six 11 (6), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core 12 teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection and 13 specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to six (6). The minimum number of teachers for any middle 14 15 school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is eight (8), as 16 calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in 17 paragraph (ii) of this subsection and specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to eight (8). The 18 minimum number of teachers for any high school with more 19 20 than forty-nine (49) ADM is ten (10), as calculated by 21 increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) 22 this subsection and additional vocational education 23 of

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1	teachers in paragraph (iv) of this subsection to ten (10).
2	The minimum number of teachers under this subparagraph
3	shall be provided for each elementary school, middle school
4	and high school grade band level for a school that contains

9	school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, more than one
10	(1) grade band level and at least one (1) grade band level

15	forty-nine (49) ADM or less, the minimum number of teachers
16	shall be calculated by increasing the sum of the core
17	teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist
18	teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection and
19	additional vocational education teachers in paragraph (iv)
20	of this subsection to one (1) teacher position for every
21	seven (7) ADM;

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(II) For each grade band level with
 more than forty-nine (49) ADM, the minimum number of
 teachers shall be calculated as provided in subparagraph
 (A) of this paragraph.

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Small school district teacher adjustment. б (vii) For all schools within a district comprised of less than 7 8 two hundred forty-three (243) total ADM and notwithstanding all other teacher resources in paragraphs (ii) through (vi) 9 10 of this subsection, resource each school with a minimum of 11 one (1) core teacher at every grade level with reported 12 ADM, plus an additional twenty percent (20%) of elementary level core teachers to calculate elementary 13 grade specialist teachers and an additional thirty-three percent 14 (33%) of middle school and high school grade core teachers 15 16 to calculate middle school and high school specialist 17 teachers;

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19 (viii) Instructional coaches:

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(A) Elementary school instructional coaches
shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
multiplied by forty-five hundredths (0.45) divided by two

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1 hundred eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than 2 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as 3 alternative schools; 4 (B) Middle and high school instructional 5 coaches shall be calculated as the product of the school's 6 ADM multiplied by forty-five hundredths (0.45) divided by 7 8 three hundred fifteen (315) for schools with more than 9 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools; 10 11 12 (C) For schools containing more than one and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, 13 (1) grade band instructional coaches shall be calculated as the product of 14 15 the school's total ADM multiplied by forty-five hundredths 16 (0.45) divided by three hundred fifteen (315). 17 18 (ix) Tutors: 19 20 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk 21 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by one hundred (100) for schools with more than forty-nine 22 (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools; 23

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1 2 (B) Minimum tutors. A minimum number of 3 tutors shall be provided for schools with more than 4 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as 5 alternative schools based upon the following: 6 7 (I) Elementary schools. If the amount 8 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less than the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight 9 10 (288), then increase the amount calculated under 11 subparagraph (A) of this paragraph so that the number of 12 tutor positions is equal to the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288); 13 14 Middle and high schools. If the 15 (II) 16 amount calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph 17 is less than the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen (315), then increase the amount calculated under 18 19 subparagraph (A) of this paragraph so that the number of 20 tutor positions is equal to the school ADM divided by three 21 hundred fifteen (315);

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1 (III) For schools containing more than 2 one (1) grade band, the minimum number of tutors shall be 3 calculated as provided in subdivision (II) of this 4 subparagraph using the total school ADM. 5 Extended day and summer school teachers: б (x) 7 8 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by 9 10 one hundred twenty (120) then multiplied by six-tenths 11 (0.6) for schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and 12 schools not designated as alternative schools; 13 14 (B) Each school district shall receive a minimum of one-half (0.5) position if the total FTE 15 16 calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less 17 than one-half (0.5). 18 19 (xi) Substitute teachers: 20 21 (A) Calculated the product of five as percent (5%) 22 multiplied by the sum of FTEpositions

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1 calculated in paragraphs (ii) through (x) of this 2 subsection; 3 4 (B) The daily substitute rate shall be equal to the product of one hundred two dollars and fifteen 5 cents (\$102.15) multiplied by seven and 6 sixty-five hundredths percent (7.65%) for social security and Medicaid 7 8 benefits; 9 10 (C) Total substitute teacher resources 11 under this paragraph shall be equal to the product of one 12 hundred seventy-five (175) multiplied by the product calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph multiplied 13 by the product calculated in subparagraph (B) of this 14 15 paragraph. 16 17 (xii) Supervisory aides: 18 19 (A) Elementary school supervisory aides 20 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied by two (2) then divided by two hundred 21 eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than forty-nine 22

1 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative
2 school;

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(B) Middle school supervisory aides shall
be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
by two (2) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for
schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
designated as an alternative school;

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10 (C) High school supervisory aides shall be 11 calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied by 12 five (5) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for 13 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 14 designated as an alternative school;

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16 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine 17 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and a middle school grade band but not a high school grade 18 19 band, supervisory aide positions shall be calculated based 20 upon the formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school ADM. For schools with more than 21 22 forty-nine (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band and either an elementary school grade band or a middle 23

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school grade band or both, supervisory aide positions shall 1 2 be calculated based upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of 3 this paragraph using the total school ADM. This 4 subparagraph shall not apply for schools designated as an alternative school. 5 б 7 (xiii) Pupil support positions: 8 9 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk 10 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by 11 one hundred (100) for schools with more than forty-nine 12 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative school; 13 14 15 (B) Minimum pupil support positions. 16 Minimum pupil support positions shall be provided for schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 17 18 designated as an alternative school based upon the 19 following: 20 21 (I) Elementary schools. If the amount 22 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less than the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight 23

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1 (288), then increase the amount of positions calculated 2 under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to equal to the 3 school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288); 4 5 (II) Middle and high schools. If the amount calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph 6 7 is less than the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen (315), then increase the amount of positions 8 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to 9 10 equal to the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen 11 (315); 12 13 (III) For schools containing more than one (1) grade band, the minimum number of tutors shall be 14 15 calculated as provided in subdivision (II) of this 16 paragraph using the total school ADM. 17 (xiv) Counselors. Calculated as total middle and 18 19 high school ADM divided by two hundred fifty (250) for 20 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 21 designated as alternative schools;

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1 (xv) Librarians. Shall be calculated for schools 2 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 3 designated as alternative schools based upon the following: 4 Elementary schools. Calculated as the 5 (A) school's ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288); 6 7 (B) Middle schools and high schools with 8 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred 9 10 five (105) ADM, provide librarian positions by prorating 11 one (1) librarian position for one hundred five (105) ADM 12 down to no librarian positions for forty-nine (49) ADM. For 13 middle schools and high schools with ADM of one hundred five (105) or more up to six hundred thirty (630), provide 14 one (1) librarian position. For middle schools and high 15 16 schools with more than six hundred thirty (630) ADM, calculate librarian positions by dividing the school's ADM 17 by six hundred thirty (630); 18 19 20 (C) For schools containing more than one 21 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, librarians 22 shall be calculated using the formula in

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subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school
 ADM.

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4 (xvi) School computer technicians. For middle 5 and high schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and 6 schools not designated as alternative schools, calculated 7 as each school's ADM divided by three hundred fifteen 8 (315). For schools containing more than one (1) grade band, 9 calculated using the total school ADM divided by three 10 hundred fifteen (315);

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12 (xvii) Principals. Shall be calculated for 13 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 14 designated as alternative schools based upon the following: 15

16 (A) Elementary schools with more than 17 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM, provide principal positions by prorating one (1) principal 18 19 position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at 20 forty-nine (49) ADM. Provide one (1) principal position for 21 elementary schools with ninety-six (96) or more ADM;

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1 (B) Middle and high schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred five (105) 2 3 ADM, provide principal positions by prorating one (1) 4 principal position for one hundred five (105) ADM down to no position for forty-nine (49) ADM. 5 Provide one (1) principal position for middle schools and high schools with 6 7 one hundred five (105) or more ADM; 8 9 (C) For schools containing more than one 10 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, provide principal positions based upon the formula in subparagraph 11 12 (B) of this paragraph. 13 14 (xviii) Assistant principals: 15 16 (A) Prorate one (1) assistant principal 17 hundred eighty-eight position for every two (288) elementary school ADM over two hundred eighty-eight (288) 18 19 ADM; 20 21 (B) Prorate one (1) assistant principal position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle 22

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1 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315) 2 ADM; 3 4 (C) For schools containing more than one 5 prorate one (1) assistant (1) grade band, principal position for every three hundred fifteen (315) ADM over б 7 three hundred fifteen (315) ADM using the total school ADM; 8 9 (D) Provide one (1) assistant principal 10 position for a school with a total ADM of forty-nine (49) 11 or less or for a school designated as an alternative 12 school. 13 14 (xix) Secretaries. Calculated for schools with 15 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as 16 alternative schools based upon the following: 17 18 (A) Elementary schools with more than 19 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM, 20 provide secretary positions by prorating one (1) secretary position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at 21 forty-nine (49) ADM. Elementary schools with more than 22 23 ninety-six (96) ADM and up to two hundred eighty-eight

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(288) ADM, provide one (1) secretary position. Prorate one
 (1) additional secretary position for every two hundred
 eighty-eight (288) elementary ADM over two hundred
 eighty-eight (288) ADM;

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(B) Middle schools and high schools with б more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred 7 8 five (105) ADM, provide secretary positions by prorating 9 one (1) secretary position for one hundred five (105) ADM 10 down to no position at forty-nine (49) ADM. Middle schools 11 and high schools with more than one hundred five (105) ADM 12 and up to three hundred fifteen (315) ADM, provide one (1) secretary position. Prorate one (1) additional secretary 13 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle 14 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315) 15 16 ADM;

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18 (C) For schools containing more than one 19 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, secretary 20 positions shall be calculated using the formula in 21 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school 22 ADM.

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1 (xx) Clerical positions. Calculated for schools 2 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not 3 designated as alternative schools based upon the following: 4 5 (A) Elementary schools with than more forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions 6 by prorating one (1) clerical position for every two hundred 7 8 eighty-eight (288) ADM down to no clerical positions for forty-nine (49) ADM; 9 10 11 (B) Middle schools with more than 12 forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions bv prorating one (1) clerical position for every three hundred 13 fifteen (315) ADM down to no clerical positions for 14 15 forty-nine (49) ADM; 16 17 (C) High schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by prorating four (4) 18 19 clerical positions for every six hundred thirty (630) ADM 20 down to no clerical positions for forty-nine (49) ADM; 21 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine 22 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and 23

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middle school grade band but not a high school grade band, 1 clerical positions shall be calculated based upon the 2 3 formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the 4 total school ADM. For schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band and either 5 an elementary school grade band or a middle school grade б band or both, clerical positions shall be calculated based 7 8 upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of this paragraph using the total school ADM. 9

12 Resources shall be calculated as the product of the
13 school's ADM multiplied by two hundred nine dollars and

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16 (xxii) Technology and equipment. Resources shall 17 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied 18 by two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). This amount shall 19 not be subject to any external cost adjustment applicable 20 under W.S. 21-13-309(o);

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1 (xxiii) Gifted and talented students. Resources 2 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM 3 multiplied by forty-four dollars and seven cents (\$44.07); 4 (xxiv) Career and technical education equipment 5 and materials. Resources shall be calculated as the product 6 of each high school's FTE vocational education teachers 7 reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(III) multiplied by 8 9 ten thousand three hundred thirteen dollars and 10 eighty-eight cents (\$10,313.88); 11 12 (xxv) Student activities shall be based upon each school's ADM. A middle school with ADM in grade nine 13 (9) shall have that ADM included in the high school ADM for 14 the high school the students would normally attend. Student 15 16 activity funding shall be calculated in the following 17 manner: 18 19 (A) Elementary school student activity 20 resources shall be calculated as the product of the total 21 elementary school ADM multiplied by twenty-six dollars and two cents (\$26.02); 22 23

Resources shall 2 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied 3 by one hundred thirty-seven dollars and seventy-two cents 4 (\$137.72); 5 (xxvii) Central office staff: б 7 8 (A) For school district ADM of five hundred 9 (500) or less, three (3) administrative positions and three 10 (3) classified positions; 11 12 (B) For school district ADM from five 13 hundred (500) to one thousand (1,000), provide four (4) administrative positions and four (4) classified positions 14 at one thousand (1,000) ADM, prorated down to three (3) 15 16 administrative positions and three (3) classified positions at five hundred (500) ADM; 17 18 19 (C) For school district ADM from one 20 thousand (1,000) to three thousand five hundred (3,500), 21 provide eight (8) administrative positions and ten (10) classified positions at three thousand five hundred (3,500) 22
