A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to optometry; amending optometrists' scope 2 of practice; prohibiting an optometrist from performing specified procedures; amending optometrists' prescription 3 and pharmaceutical drug prescribing authority; directing 4 5 the application of optometry related fines and penalties; 6 directing the board of examiners in optometry to determine 7 continuing education requirements; amending membership on the board of examiners in optometry; repealing provisions 8 that define unlawful conduct; repealing obsolete provisions 9 10 related to volunteer licensing; authorizing rulemaking; and 11 providing for effective dates.

        33-23-101. Definitions and exceptions.
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         (b) The practice of optometry is the employment of
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    any means other than the use of therapeutic lasers or
10
    surgery for diagnosing and treating ocular pathology and
    for the measurement of the powers or range of human vision
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    or the determination of the accommodative and refractive
    status of the human eye or the scope of its functions in
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    general or the adaptation of lenses or frames for the aid
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    thereof occurs when a person employs primary human eye care
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    procedures, including:
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             (i) The examination, diagnosis and treatment of
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    abnormal conditions and diseases of the eye, its adnexa and

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18	(Q) Surgery requiring incision of the

21	$\frac{(c)}{(d)}$ The provisions of this chapter do not prevent
22	a physician from treating or fitting glasses to the human
23	eye, or a physician or optometrist from filling

1 prescriptions or orders. Nor do the provisions of this

2 chapter prevent the replacing, duplicating or repairing of

3 ophthalmic lenses or the frames or fittings thereof by

4 persons qualified to write or fill prescriptions or orders

5 under the provisions of this act, nor prevent the doing of

6 the merely mechanical work upon such lenses or upon the

7 frames or fittings thereof.

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9 (d)(e) It is unlawful for any person to dispense, 10 replace or duplicate ophthalmic lenses or any contact 11 lenses without a prescription or order from a physician or 12 optometrist. A contact lens prescription shall specifically state that it is intended for contact lenses and include 13 the type and specification of the contact lenses being 14 15 prescribed. An optometrist shall provide, at no additional 16 cost to the patient, a written copy of his contact lens 17 prescription. The prescription shall only be released after the contact lenses have been adequately fitted and no more 18 19 follow-up visits are necessary to assure the contact lenses 20 fit the patient. The essential information necessary to 21 duplicate the prescription shall be defined by rules adopted by the board. All contact lens prescriptions shall 22 have an expiration date after which it shall be unlawful to 23

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1 fill such prescription. The prescribing optometrist shall

2 not be liable for any injury or condition to a patient

3 resulting from negligence in packaging, manufacturing or

4 dispensing lenses by anyone other than the prescribing

5 optometrist. Any person may file a complaint with the board

6 seeking disciplinary action concerning any violation of

7 this subsection. The board shall investigate or cause to be

8 investigated and shall resolve a complaint on its own

9 motion or upon receipt of a written complaint as provided

10 by W.S. 33-23-110. No person shall improperly fill a

11 contact lens prescription or fill an expired prescription.

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13 $\frac{(e)(f)}{(f)}$ The provisions of this chapter do not prohibit

14 the sale of goggles, sunglasses, colored glasses or

15 occupational eye-protective devices if they do not have

16 refractive values, nor do the provisions of this act

17 prohibit the sale of complete ready-to-wear eyeglasses as

18 merchandise by any person not holding himself out as

19 competent to examine, test or prescribe for the human eye

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20 or its refractive errors.

1 (f)(g) Nothing in this act shall prevent an
2 optometrist from using assistants in his practice under his
3 general supervision as defined in board rule.

5 33-23-102. Optometrist's use of certain drugs;

6 limitation.

An optometrist shall be allowed to administer and prescribe pharmaceutical agents related to the practice of optometry, excluding the following categories of oral medications: immunosuppressives, steroids, anti-fungals, sedative hypnotics, and schedule I and II narcotics. No medication shall be given by injection. Oral anti-glaucoma medications may be administered for a period not to exceed forty-eight (48) hours. An optometrist who administers or prescribes pharmaceutical agents for examination or for treatment shall provide the same standard of care to patients as that provided by a physician utilizing the same pharmaceutical agents for examination or treatment but allowing for the prescribing of hydrocodone or hydrocodone containing pharmaceutical agents regardless of schedule.

1 33-23-104. Board of examiners in optometry; created;
2 composition; designation; duties generally; appointment;

qualifications and terms of members; vacancies; oath.

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5 The Wyoming state board of examiners in optometry is the purposes 6 created to carry out and enforce provisions of this act. The board shall consist of three 7 8 (3) five (5) members appointed by the governor. In 2005, 9 one (1) board member shall be appointed for a term of three 10 (3) years, one (1) board member shall be appointed for a 11 term of two (2) years and one (1) board member shall be 12 appointed for a term of one (1) year. Thereafter, and shall 13 include three (3) licensed optometrists, one (1) member of the public and one (1) licensed health care professional 14 other than a licensed optometrist. The terms of the office 15 16 of the members appointed shall be three (3) years or until 17 their successors have qualified. Each member of the board shall be a resident of the state of Wyoming and each 18 optometrist member of the board shall have been engaged in 19 20 the actual practice of optometry in the state for at least 21 one (1) year prior to appointment. The governor shall make by 22 all appointments to fill vacancies caused 23 resignation or removal. The governor may remove any member

- 2 before entering upon their duties, shall take and subscribe
- 3 to the oath required to be taken by state officers and
- 4 shall file the oath in the office of the secretary of
- 5 state.

- 7 33-23-106. Board of examiners in optometry;
- 8 compensation of members; disposition of funds.

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- 10 (a) Each member of the board may receive as
- 11 compensation the sum paid each day to members of the state
- 12 legislature for each day spent in board meetings and per
- 13 diem and mileage as provided in W.S. 33-1-302(a)(vii).
- 14 Expenses shall be paid from the fees, fines and assessments
- 15 received under the provisions of this act. All fees, fines,
- 16 assessments and other monies, except fines and penalties,
- 17 received under the provisions of this act, may be used for
- 18 meeting the expenses of the board and in carrying out the
- 19 provisions of this act. In no event shall any expenses be
- 20 charged against the state.

- 22 33-23-109. Examinations; licensure; qualifications;
- 23 reciprocity.

2 (a) Any applicant for licensure under this act is 3 required to pass the examination series administered by the 4 National Board of Examiners in Optometry, or its successor agency, and or any other examination specified by the board 5 in rule. The applicant shall be a graduate of an optometric 6 school or college accredited by a regional or professional 7 8 accreditation organization which is recognized or approved 9 by the council on postsecondary accreditation or the United 10 States Department of Education (USDE) or the Council on 11 Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or their successor 12 agencies. Examinations shall cover subjects designated by the board. Any currently licensed person intending to 13 employ diagnostic or therapeutic pharmaceutical agents in 14 15 his practice is required to complete and pass a board 16 approved course pertaining to the use of those agents.

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(c) In addition to subsections (a) and (b) satisfying the requirements imposed under subsection (a) of this section, an applicant for licensure under this act shall provide the board fingerprints and other information necessary for a criminal history record background check as provided under W.S. 7-19-201.

2 33-23-114. Continuing education courses required.

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4 All optometrists shall take courses of study in subjects 5 relating to the practice of the profession of optometry for utilization and application of new techniques, 6 scientific and clinical advances, and achievements of 7 8 research which will assure expansive and comprehensive care 9 to the public. The board shall prescribe the length of 10 study. Attendance shall be at a course or courses approved by the board. Attendance at any course or courses of study 11 12 is to be certified to the board upon a form provided by the 13 board and submitted by each optometrist to determine the requirements for continuing education pursuant to rules 14 15 promulgated by the board. The board may use up to one-half 16 (1/2) of its annual renewal fees for the purposes of 17 contracting with institutions of higher learning, professional organizations, or qualified individuals to 18 19 provide educational programs that meet this requirement. 20 The board may also treat funds set aside for the purpose of 21 continuing education as state funds for the purpose of accepting any funds made available under federal law on a 22 23 matching basis for the programs of continuing education. In

- 1 no instance may the board require a greater number of hours
- 2 of study than are available at approved courses held within
- 3 this state. The board shall require three (3) hours of
- 4 continuing education related to the responsible prescribing
- 5 of controlled substances every two (2) years. The board may
- 6 waive the requirements of this section in cases of
- 7 certified illness or undue hardship.

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- 12 Section 3. The Wyoming state board of examiners in
- 13 optometry shall promulgate any rules necessary to implement
- 14 the provisions of this act.

- 19 section, this act is effective immediately upon completion
- 20 of all acts necessary for a bill to become law as provided
- 21 by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming Constitution.
