1	AN ACT relating to professions and occupations; amending
2	the Occupational Therapy Practice Act; adding and amending
3	definitions; defining unprofessional conduct; amending the
4	scope of practice; amending licensure and temporary
5	licensure standards; amending standards for reentry into
6	the profession; amending provisions related to foreign
7	license applicants; amending continuing education
8	requirements; specifying who must hold a license;
9	specifying the role of unlicensed persons; repealing
10	archaic provisions; amending board duties and procedures;
11	providing for licensure waiver; repealing criminal
12	penalties; and providing for an effective date.

             (ii) "Certified Occupational therapy assistant"
    or "OTA" means a person licensed under this act to assist
17
    in the practice of occupational therapy, under this act,

    and who works under the supervision of a registered an
20
    occupational therapist to perform tasks requiring
    occupational therapy professional knowledge or judgment;
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1	(iii) "Occupational therapy" is the use of
2	purposeful activity with individuals who are limited by
3	physical injury or illness, psychosocial dysfunction,
4	developmental or learning disabilities or the aging process
5	in order to maximize independence, prevent disability and
6	maintain health. The practice encompasses evaluation,
7	treatment and consultation. Specific occupational therapy
8	services include but are not limited to the following
9	services provided individually, in groups or through social
10	systems means:
11	
12	(J) The therapeutic use of occupations
13	including everyday life activities with individuals,
14	groups, populations or organizations to support
15	participation, performance and function in roles and
16	situations in home, school, workplace, community and other
17	settings;
18	
19	(K) The provision of services for
20	habilitation, rehabilitation and the promotion of health
21	and wellness to those who have or are at risk for
22	developing an illness, injury, disease, disorder,

1	condition, impairment, disability, activity limitation or
2	participation restriction;
3	
4	(M) Addressing the physical, cognitive,
5	psychosocial, sensory-perceptual and other aspects of
6	performance in a variety of contexts and environments to
7	support engagement in occupations, contexts and
8	environments that affect physical and mental health,
9	well-being and quality of life;
10	
11	(N) Performing the tasks of occupational
12	therapy through personal interaction or appropriate use of
13	telecommunication services and other communication
14	technologies;
15	
16	(O) Performing the tasks of an occupational
17	therapist or occupational therapy assistant commensurate
18	with his education, training and experience;
19	
20	(P) The practice of occupational therapy
21	which includes:

1	(I) The evaluation of factors
2	affecting activities of daily living, instrumental
3	activities of daily living, rest and sleep, education,
4	work, play, leisure and social participation;
5	
6	(II) The use of methods or approaches
7	to direct the process of interventions; and

10	procedures to promote or enhance safety and performance in
11	activities of daily living, instrumental activities of
12	daily living, rest and sleep, education, work, play,

15	(iv) " Registered <u>O</u>ccupational therapist" means a
16	person licensed to practice occupational therapy under this
17	act;

19	(v) "Occupational therapy telehealth" means the
20	provision of occupational therapy services across a
21	distance, using telecommunications technology for the
22	evaluation, intervention or consultation without requiring

the occupational therapist and recipient to be physically 1 2 located in the same place; 3 4 (vi) "Unprofessional conduct" means: 5 6 Committing any act involving a patient or which adversely relates to the practice of occupational 7 8 therapy which results in a felony or misdemeanor 9 conviction. A plea of guilty, nolo contendere or similar 10 plea shall be considered a conviction; 11 12 (B) Violating professional sexual 13 boundaries by soliciting, encouraging, threatening, forcing 14 or engaging in any sexual act or relationship with a patient, regardless of consent. A consensual sexual act or 15 16 relationship shall not be deemed unprofessional conduct if the patient licensee relationship is terminated prior to 17 the sexual act or relationship or if the sexual act or 18 19 relationship occurs prior to any patient licensee 20 relationship. The treatment of a spouse or significant 21 other where the relationship is in place prior to the 22 beginning of any patient licensee relationship shall not be

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1	unprofessional conduct if treatment is conducted without
2	third party compensation;
3	
4	(C) Sexual harassment of a patient or staff
5	member;
6	
7	(D) Being diagnosed with substance abuse as
8	defined by W.S. 35-1-613(a)(viii);
9	
10	(E) Denial of a license to practice
11	occupational therapy or any disciplinary action against a
12	licensee by any other state, the District of Columbia,
13	territory or country for an action constituting
14	unprofessional conduct in Wyoming;
15	
16	(F) Failure to report to the board known or
17	reasonably suspected violations of the laws and regulations
18	governing the practice of occupational therapy in Wyoming;
19	
20	(G) Submission of false information to the
21	board;

1	(H) Failure to notify the board within
2	thirty (30) days of a malpractice final judgement or
3	settlement involving the occupational therapist;
4	
5	(J) Aiding or abetting the practice of
6	occupational therapy in violation of W.S. 33-40-103 by any
7	person not licensed to practice in Wyoming;
8	
9	(K) Submission of false or materially
10	misleading billing information;
11	
12	(M) Using any term other than "occupational
13	therapist, registered," "occupational therapist," "OT,"
14	"certified occupational therapist," "COTA," "occupational
15	therapy assistant" or "OTA" to reflect licensure;
16	
17	(N) Employing, either directly or
18	indirectly, any licensee under suspension or revocation,
19	except as may be authorized by the board, or any person not
20	licensed to practice occupational therapy to perform any
21	task requiring licensure except that an unlicensed person
22	may be employed to perform tasks under supervision not

1	requiring occupational therapy professional knowledge or
2	judgement;

4	(O) Accepting payment for any part of
5	<pre>professional services delivered as a volunteer;</pre>
6	
7	(P) Obtaining a license by means of fraud,
8	misrepresentation or concealment of material facts;
9	
10	(Q) Violating any lawful order, rule or
11	regulation adopted by the board;

13	(R) Violating any provision of this act.

20	(a) Effective on July 1, 1992, No person shall hold

12	(a) An applicant applying for a license as ϵ
13	registered an occupational therapist or as a certified
14	occupational therapy assistant shall file a specified
15	written application showing to the satisfaction of the
16	board that the applicant:

18	(i) Has a good reputation for honesty,
19	trustworthiness and competence in all matters relevant to
20	practicing the profession of occupational therapist
21	therapy; and

2	successful completion of the national certification exam
3	from a certification agency recognized by the board in its

6	(b) The board may establish continuing education
7	requirements for an active license provided that:

9	(i) The requirement shall not be more than

11	year; and

15	counted toward fulfilling the requirement but it shall not

- 4 certified occupational therapy assistants and shall
- 5 establish standards for acceptable performance.

- 14 (a) The board shall grant a license to any person
- 15 certified prior to July 1, 1992 as an occupational
- 16 therapist registered (OTR) or as a certified occupational
- 17 therapy assistant (COTA) by the American occupational
- 18 therapy certification board (AOTCB). The board may waive
- 19 the examination, education, or experience requirements and
- 20 grant a license to any person certified by the AOTCB after
- 21 July 1, 1992, if the board determines the requirements for
- 22 the certification are equivalent to the requirements for

17	(a) Any license issued under this act shall be
18	subject to annual renewal as provided by the board, however
19	no late renewal of a license may be granted more than five
20	(5) years one (1) year after its expiration.

22	(f) The board shall establish by rule reentry
23	procedures for the licensure of persons who have previously

Τ	practiced as an occupational therapist or occupational
2	therapy assistant for not less than one (1) year, but who
3	do not qualify for renewal of their license under

12	conduct was sufficiently minor, has been rectified or is
13	sufficiently in the past so as not to present a risk to the

21	renew a license, may suspend or revoke a license, or may

- 21 occupational therapy services to the public, teaching or
- 22 research in occupational therapy for at least three (3)

These four (4) 4 members shall at all times be holders of valid licenses under this act. The remaining member shall be a member of 5 the public with an interest in the rights of the consumers 6 of health services. 7 8 9 (b) By July 1, 1991 the governor shall appoint two 10 (2) board members for a term of one (1) year, two (2) board members for a term of two (2) years and one (1) for a term 11 12 of three (3) years. Appointments made thereafter 13 Appointments to the board of occupational therapy shall be 14 for three (3) year terms. No person shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms. Terms shall begin on the first 15 16 day of the fiscal year and end on the last day of the 17 fiscal year or until successors are appointed., except for the first appointed members who shall serve through the 18 last fiscal day of the year in which they are appointed. 19 20 Vacancies in the membership of the board shall be filled 21 for the unexpired term by the governor. The governor may

remove any board member as provided by W.S. 9-1-202.
