# A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to school finance; making temporary and 2 permanent reductions and contingent further modifications to education funding; creating a select committee on school 3 finance recalibration as specified; limiting transportation 4 5 expenditures; authorizing Medicaid reimbursement 6 special education purposes as specified; providing 7 appropriations; modifying previous appropriations; providing rulemaking authority; providing applicability; 8 and providing for effective dates. 9

11 (v) Based upon ADM computations and identified 12 school configurations within each district pursuant to paragraph (iv) of this subsection, compute the foundation 13 program amount for each district as prescribed by the 14 15 education resource block grant model adopted by the Wyoming 16 legislature as defined under W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xiv), as contained within the spreadsheets and accompanying reports 17 referenced under W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xvii), on file with the 18 19 secretary of state and maintained by the 20 superintendent pursuant to W.S. 21-2-202(e). - 2. Not later than November 1, 2016, pursuant to W.S. 21-13-309(o) and (u), the joint education interim committee and the joint appropriations committee shall review information prepared for the model monitoring process, including school year 2015-2016 average daily membership data, to inform recommendations made to the governor and the legislature pursuant to law to modify the external cost adjustment contained in footnote 1(a)(ii) of this section. Not later than January 1, 2017, the department of education shall provide preliminary student enrollment data for school year 2016-2017 to the joint appropriations committee. The joint appropriations committee shall report any recommendation to revise the external cost adjustment as a result of the review of the preliminary student enrollment data to the governor and the legislature.

1 Section 5. The amendments to 2016 Wyoming Session 2 Laws, Chapter 31, Section 2, Section 205, Footnote 1(a)(ii) 3 enacted pursuant to section 4 of this act shall be given 4 precedence and shall prevail over any amendments to 2016 Wyoming Session Laws, Chapter 31, Section 2, Section 205, 5 Footnote 1(a)(ii) in 2017 House Bill 0001 to the extent 6 that 2017 House Bill 0001 is in conflict with this act. To 7 8 the extent required by this section, adjust totals and

renumber as necessary.

11 Section 6. The department of education and department 12 of health shall promulgate rules by July 1, 2017 to comply with amendments to W.S. 21-13-321 and 42-4-103 in section 1 13 of this act. If the Medicaid state plan is amended to allow 14 15 reimbursement for special education services, school 16 districts may seek reimbursement for allowable expenditures. The Medicaid program may seek and receive 17 18 reimbursement from the appropriation under this section for 19 state share of these Medicaid expenses. On the 20 effective date of this section there is appropriated up to 21 five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) from the school foundation program account to the department of education. 22 23 This amount shall only be expended on a district by

1 district basis as determined necessary by the state

2 superintendent to ensure all maintenance of effort

3 requirements of federal law are being met by each district

4 and to provide matching funds required for reimbursement by

5 the Medicaid program. Any unexpended, unencumbered amounts

6 appropriated under this section shall revert as provided by

7 law on June 30, 2018.

11 (a) The reductions implemented by this act are

12 intended to be temporary pending a recalibration of the

13 education resource block grant model. The select committee

14 on school finance recalibration is created consisting of

15 the following members:

16

17 (i) Five (5) members of the Wyoming senate

18 appointed by the president of the senate of which one (1)

19 member shall be the chairman of the senate education

20 committee and one (1) member shall be the chairman of the

21 senate appropriations committee;

1 (ii) Five (5) members of the Wyoming house of 2 representatives appointed by the speaker of the house of 3 representatives, of which one (1) member shall be the 4 chairman of the house education committee and one (1)5 member shall be the chairman of the house appropriations 6 committee; 7 8 (iii) Not more than four (4) members from each 9 house shall be from the same political party; 10 11 (iv) The cochairmen of the select committee 12 shall be appointed by the president of the senate and the 13 speaker of the house, respectively. 14 15 The select committee shall undertake a study to 16 review the state educational program under W.S. 21-9-101 and to recalibrate the education resource block grant model 17 provided under W.S. 21-13-309(t) to determine if 18 19 modifications are necessary to ensure the model remains 20 effective and cost-based in light of changing conditions 21 and modifications to law. If the committee determines an alternative to the education resource block grant model 22 should be reviewed and developed to more efficiently meet 23

the constitutional duties of the legislature in providing 1 2 K-12 education funding the committee shall not limit its 3 study to a recalibration of the existing cost-based model. 4 The select committee shall be staffed by the 5 (C) legislative service office. The department of education, 6 department of workforce services, school districts and the 7 8 school finance data advisory committee established under W.S. 21-2-203 shall collect and provide the information 9 10 requested by the select committee. 11 12 The select committee may seek out expert opinions and may hire consultants as necessary to complete the study 13 and recommendations required under this section. 14 legislative service office is authorized, subject to the 15 16 approval of management council, to contract with consultants for the purposes of this subsection to complete 17 recalibration of the education resource block grant model. 18 19

20 (e) The select committee shall report its
21 recommendations and any associated legislation to the
22 legislature not later than January 31, 2018. The select
23 committee may develop and introduce legislation as

- 1 necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section,
- 2 provided that no legislation shall be introduced by the
- 3 committee unless it is approved by a majority of the
- 4 members of the select committee from each house.

- 6 (f) Appointments shall be made under this section not
- 7 later than March 15, 2017. The select committee shall exist
- 8 until March 31, 2018. Any vacancy occurring on the select
- 9 committee shall be filled by the president of the senate or
- 10 speaker of the house of representatives, as appropriate,
- 11 immediately upon the vacancy occurring.

- 13 (g) For the period beginning on the effective date of
- 14 this section and ending June 30, 2018, there is
- 15 appropriated from the school foundation program account to

20 dollars (\$206,000,000.00) from the school foundation

23 effective date of this section and ending June 30, 2018.
