## for

1 A JOINT RESOLUTION requesting Congress to require the 2 federal Environmental Protection Agency to respect the 3 primacy of Wyoming in developing guidelines for regulating 4 carbon dioxide emissions.

6 WHEREAS, a reliable and affordable energy supply is vital 7 to Wyoming's economic growth, jobs, and the overall 8 interests of its citizens; and

10 WHEREAS, Wyoming supports an all-the-above energy strategy 11 because it is in the best interests of the state of Wyoming 12 and the nation; and

14 WHEREAS, the United States has abundant supplies of coal 15 and natural gas that provide economic and energy security 16 benefits; and

1 WHEREAS, carbon regulations for existing power plants could 2 threaten the affordability and reliability of Wyoming's 3 electricity supplies and therefore threaten the wellbeing 4 5 of its citizens; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the U.S. Energy Information Administration projects that U.S. electric sector carbon dioxide emissions 8 will be fourteen percent (14%) below 2005 levels in 2020; 9 10 and 11 WHEREAS, on June 25, 2013, the President directed the 12 13 Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency 14 (EPA) to issue standards, regulations or guidelines to address carbon dioxide emissions from new, existing, 15 modified and reconstructed fossil-fueled power plants; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the President expressly recognized that states 18 "will play a central role in establishing and implementing 19 carbon standards for existing power plants;" and 20 21 WHEREAS, the Clean Air Act requires EPA to establish a 22 "procedure" under which each state shall develop a plan for 23

establishing and implementing standards of performance for 1 existing sources within the state; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the Clean Air Act expressly allows states in 4 developing and applying such standards of performance "to 5 take into consideration, among other factors, the remaining 6 7 useful life of the existing source to which such standard applies;" and 8 9 WHEREAS, EPA's existing regulations provide that states may 10 11 adopt "less stringent emissions standards or longer compliance schedules" than EPA's guidelines based on 12 13 factors such as "unreasonable cost of control," "physical 14 impossibility of installing necessary control equipment," or other factors that make less stringent standards or 15 longer compliance times "significantly more reasonable;" 16 17 and 18 WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of electricity 19 consumers in Wyoming to continue to benefit from reliable, 20 affordable electricity provided by coal and natural gas-21 based electricity generating plants. 22 23

1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE 2 LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WYOMING:

3

Section 1. That Wyoming urges EPA, in developing guidelines for regulating carbon dioxide emissions from existing power plants, to respect the primacy of Wyoming and to take into account the unique policies, energy needs, resource mix and economic priorities of Wyoming and other states.

11 Section 2. That EPA should issue guidelines and 12 approve state-established performance standards that are 13 based on reductions of carbon dioxide emissions that are 14 practical and achievable by measures undertaken at fossil-15 fueled power plants.

17 Section 3. That Wyoming and other states should be 18 given maximum flexibility by EPA to implement carbon 19 dioxide performance standards for fossil-fueled power 20 plants within their jurisdiction.

1 Section 4. That the Secretary of State of Wyoming 2 transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the 3 United States, to the President of the Senate and the 4 Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United 5 States Congress and to the Wyoming Congressional 6 Delegation.
